



I had contacted Michigan Maritime Museum in South Haven this spring regarding a large collection of ship models they owned and were at that time on loan to the Icebreaker Mackinaw museum at Mackinac City. The collection, which featured over 30 models, was supposed to be returned to South Haven at that time. As it turned out, the loan was extended for another year.

I recontacted the Director of Michigan Maritime, Patty Montgomery, again this fall, thinking that the models would be moved back in the spring, only to find they were to be moved within the next couple of weeks. One of the models was a huge model of the Steamer Alabama, built for Shaw Walker. This model is in a case approximately 3ft.X 8ft. I used to visit him and the model and we exchanged pleasant letters regarding the model for some time before his death. His sons donated it to the Maritime Museum. It is a magnificently detailed model down to rivets in the hull.

For those who do not know the history of the Alabama, it was the "Queen of the Lakes" in it's time. It was owned by the Goodrich Transportation Co. and it's home port was the Goodrich Dock, now the Mart Dock. It was as familiar here in Muskegon into the 30's as the *Clipper* was in the 40's through the 70's, and a favorite of Mr. Walker.

To make a long story shorter, the arrangements were made for the models to be delivered here in Muskegon, instead of South Haven, on loan to us for a period of two years. There was a hitch, though, the conditions called for the Alabama model to be climate controlled, and we do not have such a place on the ship at this time. As a result of an extensive search for a spot for that big a model, we have an agreement with Marti Piette, director of the Muskegon County Airport, to put the model on display there for the period of the loan.

The models arrived, almost on time, Oct. 29th. We had a welcoming committee of Tom, Rick, Jim, Terry, Mike and I to unload the models. The models had been very poorly loaded in a UHAUL trailer, and the large pieces of glass that made up the case on the Alabama model were all broken. Fortunately, there was a representative of the Maritime Museum on hand to verify the damage. We could not leave the model at the airport, and Terry volunteered to have us put it in his heated antique car garage. It is there currently. We also got a tour of Terry's collection of AMC cars. I was impressed, having over the years owned 7 AMC Eagles.

We have corresponded with Patty at Michigan Maritime, and if we would replace the glass, they would give us a 10 yr. lease on that big model, with a renewable option. We have gotten estimates for the glass, after researching whether or not to replace with plexi or lexan, and the best estimate is for \$1137.42. We are going to take up a collection amongst us to pay for the glass. Anyone who would like to donate towards this would be more than welcome. If the insurance for the Mackinaw comes through, we will be reimbursed to what they pay.

Needless to say, the Alabama Room I envisioned some years back is now going to become reality. We will work on this to get it painted and climate controlled so we can move the model onboard. At the present we are considering painting the room in the original colors of the ship. We have a fair sized collection of Alabama artifacts, and have access to more, along with countless pictures of the interior and exterior of the ship. The room for the ship will be just forward of the current model room, with access to it from that room during the tour season. The access was cut some years back when the idea of an Alabama Room was first conceived.

The final count on the models is 28, the Maritime Museum has retained three for their current displays. We also have been promised a return of the Ken Jillbert models for 2015, as well as, giving us what will be a very impressive display of Great Lakes ship models. We will promote these both online and through the newspapers come Spring, and judging from the past interest in the models, we should have many visitors on board to see them in 2015.

We have formed a small committee of Terry, Mike and I to oversee the repair of the Alabama case and reinstall the glass. We will notify folks when our work sessions will be, and if you are interested in helping, let me know and I will include you on the call list. The *Clipper* has a nearly complete set of yearly pamphlets for the operating years. I have donated several including the rare 1941, but we are missing 1942, 1943, 1947, 1948 and 1957. If anyone has these years and would wish to donate them to the ship, they would be most welcome. I would like to be able to put the whole set on display on the ship come spring. If we don't have them all by then, I will put what we have on display.


